Step 2. We accept the invitation to follow Christ.

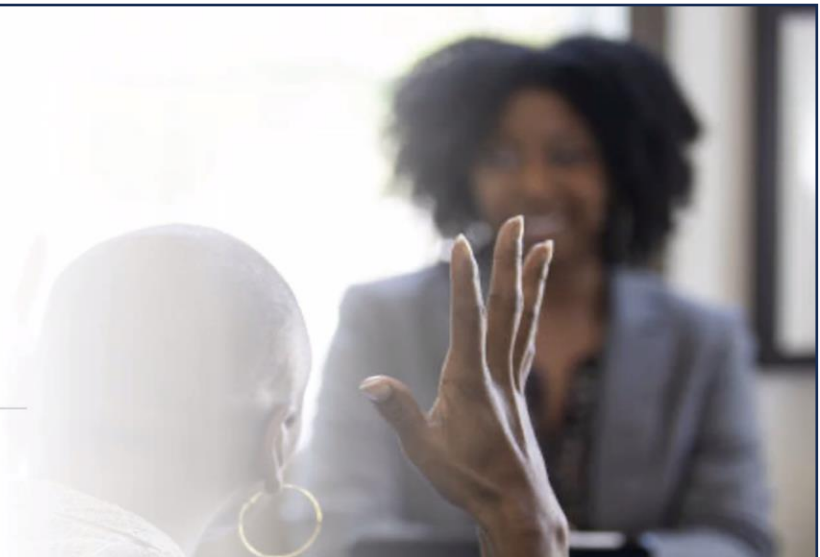
Step 3. We are directed to count the cost of following Jesus.

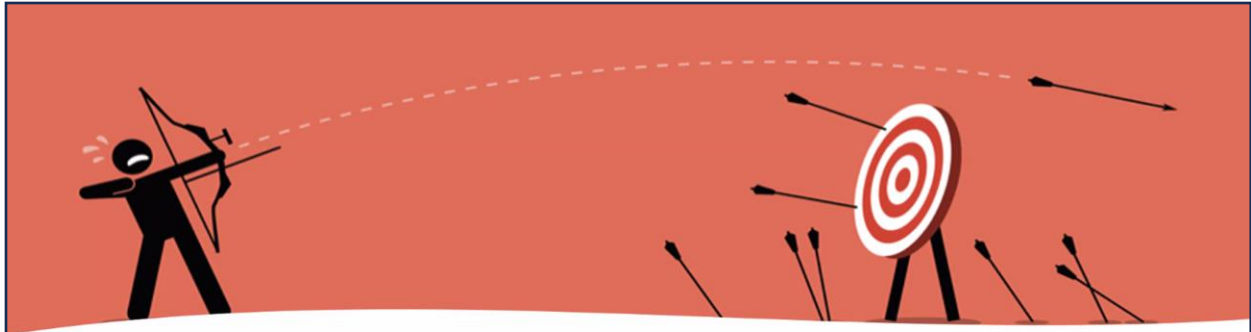
Step 4. We begin following Christ as He leads, teach and model for us, how to operate in **love**. (It's not emotional it's devotional)

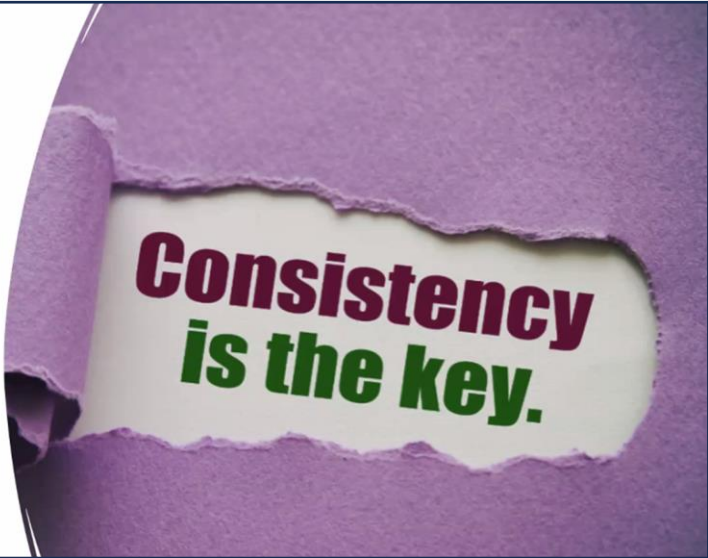

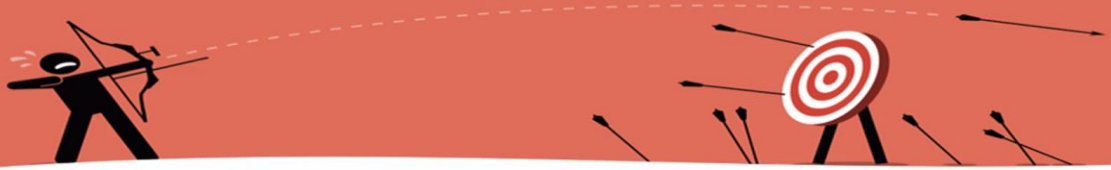

A consistent walk of faith flows from a deeply committed love relationship with God. We devote ourselves wholly to Him and seek His kingdom above everything else

What is *God's* love language? How does He prefer to receive love?

God's love language is CONSTANT OBEDIENCE. John 14:15

It's loving *obedience*. It's the constant, most consistent theme running through the Bible.

What is the behavior of a devoted person?

General

Being devoted to something means being focused on that particular thing almost exclusively. When you are devoted to a cause, you work to achieve its goals. When you are devoted to a person, you place their needs above your own. Being devoted doesn't have to refer only to personal relationships.

What is the behavior of a devoted person?

Spiritually

When you are devoted to God, your life is transformed. You begin orienting your activities toward what The Lord wants.

Doubt and confusion diminish, as you always have a benchmark to refer to.

People and circumstances that no longer fit fall away.

This type of devotion takes a surrender of your personal wants and desires into something that holds greater meaning for you.

Psalms 42:1, 73:25

Sins of Omission & Commission

We miss the mark when we sin.

There are two basic ways we sin: either by omission or commission.

Sins of omission are those in which we knew we should have done something good, but refused.

Sins of commission is a sin we take action to commit, whether in thought, word, or deed. A sin of commission can be intentional or unintentional. Foreknowledge is not the issue.

First you must go and find your brother. Tell him that you are sorry. Then you can both become friends with each other again. After that, you can return to the altar and give your gift to God.

Not being able to apologize to someone you have wronged is a sin.

What does consistency in the Christian life look like in the day-to-day application?

We dedicate ourselves to the Word of God,
A mature consistency of doctrine grounds us in the truth.

Consistent reading and studying positions you to be an ever-learning agent.

No matter how long you've been saved, there's always revelations in the word to learn and glean. The process of discipleship through the word of God invites us to be continual learners. We should be teachable and open to God exposing us to new insights and revelations. This is the power of being disciplined through the word. You're illuminated to put off some things, and to put on some things. You're always on a journey of growth with God and personal maturation.

Consistency in faith strengthens our relationship with God.

Just as in human relationships, consistency builds trust and deepens intimacy. When we are constant in our faith—steadfast in prayer, devoted to studying God's word, and committed to living according to His will—we draw closer to Him and experience the joy of His presence in our lives.

Jesus never changes. He is the best example of living a life of consistency. He never moved away from the word of God. He never departed from what God said to say and do. Never, not once. His life was a life of consistency. If we desire to walk like Jesus walked, we too must endeavor to live a life of consistency. Therein lies the key. They key to a successful life.

RESULTS/REWARDS

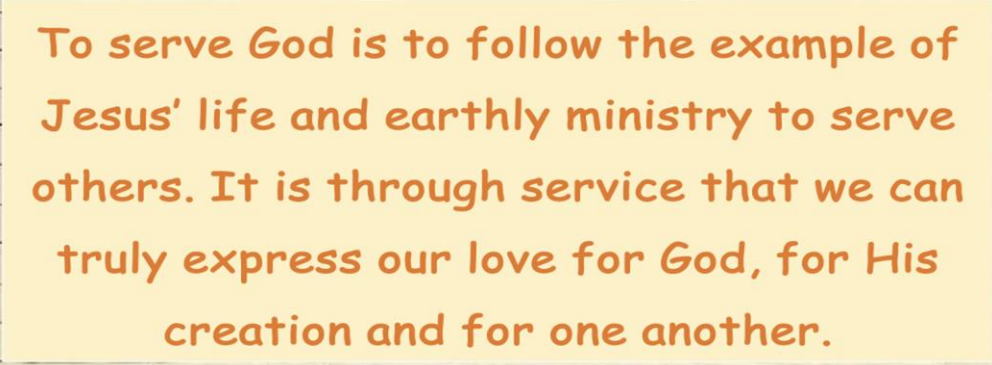

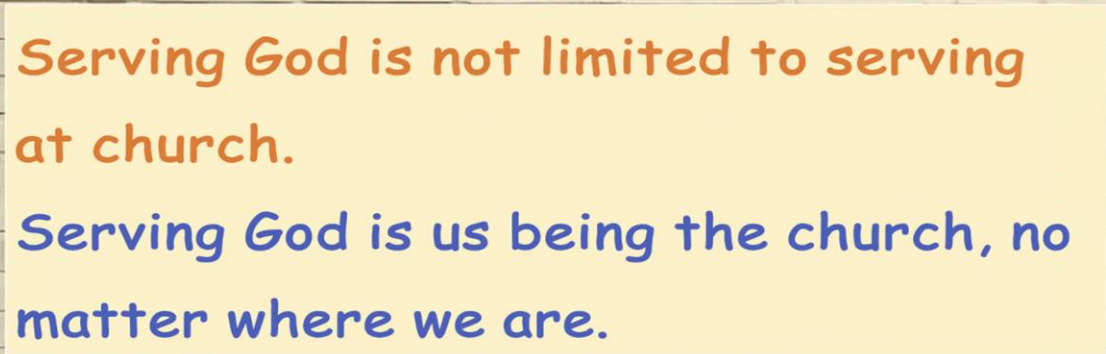

In that way, you will be acting as true children of your Father in heaven. For he gives his sunlight to both the evil and the good, and he sends rain on the just and the unjust alike.

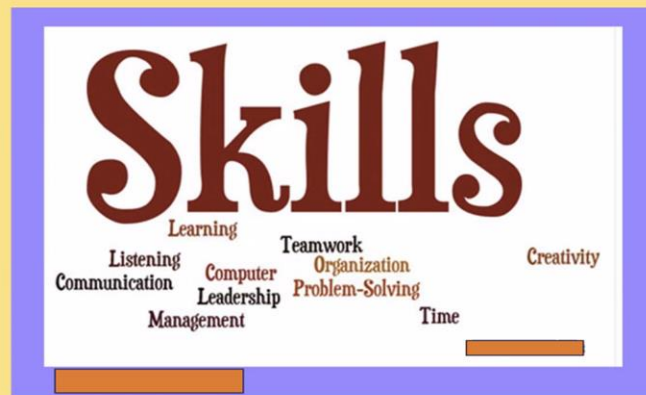
If you love only those who love you, what reward is there for that? Even corrupt tax collectors do that much.

Contributing to the kingdom

Contributing to the kingdom, means **actively participating in** and **promoting the values and principles of God's kingdom** by living a life that reflects love, compassion, justice, and **service towards others**, essentially **putting God's priorities first in all aspects of your life**, including your actions, thoughts, and words; this can be achieved **through acts** like sharing the Gospel, serving others in need, demonstrating Christian character, and **actively participating** in your church community.

Key aspects for contributing to the kingdom

Sharing the Gospel: Talking to others about Jesus Christ and the good news of salvation.

Developing Christ-like character: Cultivating qualities like love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

Supporting Christian ministries: Contributing financially or through volunteer work to organizations that spread the Gospel and serve others.

Living with integrity: Maintaining high moral standards and being honest in all interactions.

Scripture that supports the contribution of disciples

We are exhorted to use the gifts we receive—the talents and uniqueness of our created nature, as well as our spiritual gifts—to serve one another with kindness, respect, and appreciation.

Always remember this

The key thing to remember is that we are not working / serving to please people – not the pastor, not the leaders, not even your parents or friends – everything we do is for the glory of the Master, the one whom we have freely chosen to serve.

As children of God we ought to serve Him with whatever gifts He has blessed us with and, we should be determined to excel in every area that we may be placed in. This will require serious commitment, time and consistent work.

We need to serve because it helps us to grow in Christlikeness.

God knows where we need to grow, and **serving isn't always easy**. It often means working with personalities that are unlike our own, and doing things that stretch our abilities. Though not an exhaustive list, we learn **humility**, patience, meekness, self-awareness, leadership, discernment, and wisdom when we serve. God knows that we will grow to look more like Christ through serving His church.

John 13:1-17

Jesus washing the feet of the disciples occurred in the upper room during the Last Supper and has significance in three ways.

1. For Jesus, it was the display of His humility and servanthood in forgiving sinners.
2. For the disciples, the washing of their feet displayed a mindset in direct contrast to their heart attitude at that time.
3. For us, washing feet is symbolic of our role in the body of Christ.

Luke 22:24-27

"Then they began to argue among themselves about who would be the greatest among them."

"Jesus told them, "In this world the kings and great men Lord it over their people, yet they are called 'friends of the people.'"

But among you it will **be different**. Those who are the greatest among you should take the lowest rank, and the leader should be like a servant.

Who is more important, the one who sits at the table or the one who serves? The one who sits at the table, of course. **But not here!** For I am among you as one who serves."

No Place For Arrogance

Jesus taught and modeled humility, and his disciples exemplified this by prioritizing service, embracing simplicity, and placing others before themselves.

Here's how Jesus' disciples demonstrated humility, as gleaned from biblical narratives:

**Service and Lowering Oneself:**

Jesus himself washed his disciples' feet, a task typically done for slaves, demonstrating humility through service. His disciples followed suit by also serving others and doing what they were told without seeking attention.

Simplicity and Humility:

Jesus and his disciples traveled lightly, only taking what was necessary and accepting hospitality where it was offered. This reflects a humble attitude of contentment and reliance on God rather than material possessions

Luke 9:2-4

“Then he sent them out to tell everyone about the Kingdom of God and to heal the sick.

“Take nothing for your journey,” he instructed them. “Don’t take a walking stick, a traveler’s bag, food, money, or even a change of clothes.

Wherever you go, stay in the same house until you leave town.”

Prioritizing Others:

Jesus taught that the greatest among them would be the one who served others, and his disciples emulated this by caring for the sick, the poor, and the marginalized. They placed the needs of others before their own desires and ambitions.

Acts 3:1-11

Example of Obedience:

Jesus' humility extended to his obedience, even to death, and his disciples also showed obedience to God's will and to the authority of Jesus, recognizing their dependence on Him.

Philippians 2:5-9

Acts 4:16-20

““What should we do with these men?” they asked each other. “We can’t deny that they have performed a miraculous sign, and everybody in Jerusalem knows about it.

But to keep them from spreading their propaganda any further, we must warn them not to speak to anyone in Jesus’ name again.”

So they called the apostles back in and commanded them never again to speak or teach in the name of Jesus.

But Peter and John replied, “Do you think God wants us to obey you rather than him?

We cannot stop telling about everything we have seen and heard.”

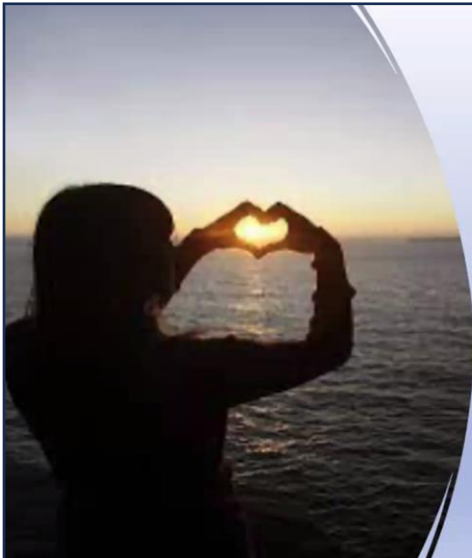

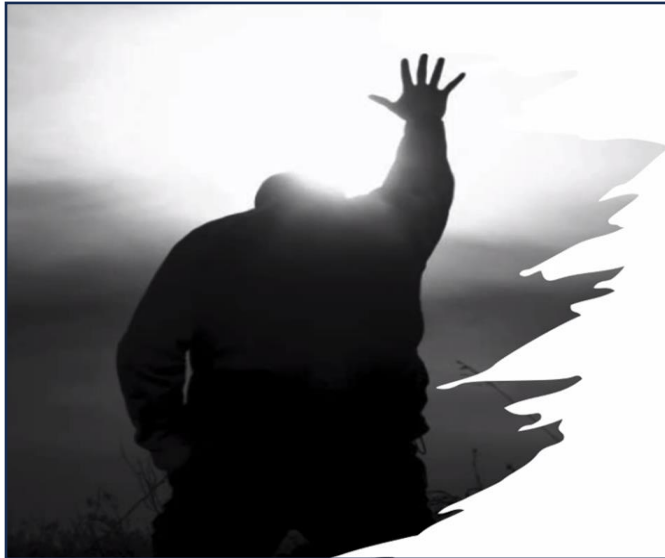

While related, "being *intentional*" and "being *determined*" aren't exactly the same.

Intentionality focuses on making deliberate and purposeful choices,

while **determination** emphasizes unwavering resolve to achieve a goal.

Here are some examples of Jesus' intentionality:

Prayer and Seeking God's Will: Jesus **frequently** retreated to spend time in prayer, seeking guidance and aligning his actions with the Father's will.

Deliberate Choices in Ministry: Jesus **intentionally** chose who he would teach and serve, focusing on the marginalized and those in need, rather than the powerful or influential.

Unwavering Commitment to His Mission: Jesus knew his purpose and **stayed focused** on it, even in the face of opposition and suffering. He willingly faced the cross, knowing it was part of God's plan.

Teaching and Sharing the Gospel: Jesus **intentionally** shared the good news of the Kingdom of God with anyone who would listen, using parables, miracles, and his own life as examples.

Forgiveness and Compassion: Jesus showed **intentional** compassion and forgiveness, even towards those who persecuted him.

Serving Others: Jesus **consistently** served others, demonstrating humility and love, even washing his disciples' feet.

Discipling Others: Jesus **intentionally** trained and equipped his disciples to continue his mission after his ascension.

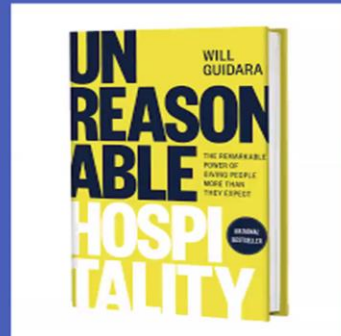
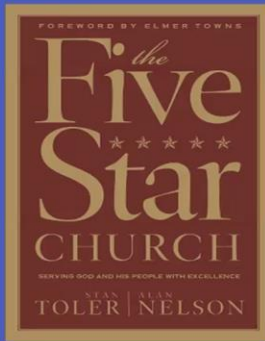

Christian hospitality examples in the New Testament

In this account, Jesus demonstrated hospitality by engaging in a conversation with a Samaritan woman at a well. Despite cultural barriers and prejudices, Jesus showed kindness, respect, and genuine interest in her life, ultimately revealing his identity as the Messiah.

The Last Supper (Matthew 26:17-30, Mark 14:12-26, Luke 22:7-23)

Jesus shared a final meal with his disciples, which is now known as the Last Supper or the Passover meal. This act of hospitality was a deeply significant moment where Jesus demonstrated his love and fellowship with his closest followers.

The Early Church (Acts 2:42-47, Acts 4:32-37)

The early Christian community in Jerusalem practiced a form of communal hospitality, sharing their possessions and resources with one another. They provided for the needs of those in their community, ensuring that no one was in lack of any need.

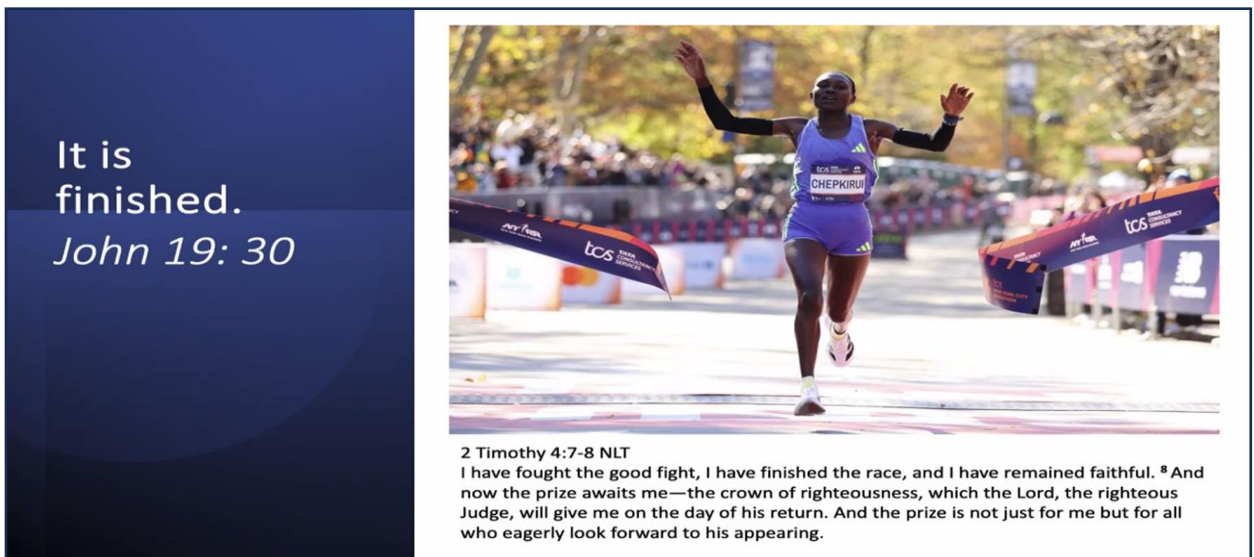
